2021 was a year which tested staff and artists, being plunged into a 2 month lockdown in September after an arduous yet remarkably successful year in 2020. Emerging at the end of 2021 to constantly shifting government directives and restrictions while adjusting to a new world of 'living with Covid' presented many challenges. This included uncertainty with NDIS through periods when our artists were unable to physically attend the studio due to restrictions.

Despite these challenges, the Arts Project community worked together to ensure the organisation remained committed to its purpose and pushed through achieving many goals.

Board and key staff identified the organisation's most important priorities and revised the strategic plan with a focus on future proofing. This refocus ensures that Arts Project can continue to excel while remaining responsive and adaptive in uncertain times.

This led to the launch of APA Creatives, an annual giving program that brings together our generous donors and celebrates their contribution through a range of exciting events and opportunities.


We were grateful to receive 4 year operational funding from Creative Victoria for the first time, providing us with an investment in leadership and organisational infrastructure to maintain Arts Projects core operations.

I would like to thank my Board members for their support, commitment and expert council. We bid a sad farewell to member Michael Schwarz after 6 years of dedicated contribution to the APA board. We were thrilled to welcome Sheryl Bates, a parent of an artist at Arts Project Australia and an educational consultant in teacher training, curriculum development and Special Education.

The success of the organisation weathering another difficult year was made possible by the company's excellent track record prior to 2020, its ongoing strong governance, coupled with an active and enthusiastic Board. In consultation with the Board and Executive, this focus has ensured we can remain resilient for years to come. The Board acknowledges the extraordinary work and commitment of all the executive and staff at APA, led by Executive Director Sue Roff.

The collective enthusiasm of the team of board, staff, artists and supporters ensures this vibrant community continues its invaluable contribution to arts and culture both nationally and internationally.

Fortunately with our remote delivery plans in place we were able to revert to both an online studio and gallery program again until restrictions lifted. Arts Project continues to adapt and respond to the everchanging external environment with grace and agility.

Our new Collingwood gallery space has experienced excellent visitation this year, despite ongoing restrictions and the position of this space in a broader arts precinct has provide the opportunity to connect and collaborate with a wide range of artists and organisations.

We have continued to grow and develop our new digital program – Satellite Arts provided an online art community not only for APA artists isolating at home, but also for artists in regional Victoria and Tasmania who enjoy weekly artmaking sessions with staff artists. Our international platform artetal.org has seen numerous collaborations between artists and curators from Australia and the UK and has developed exhibitions celebrating these collaborations in both the UK and Australia.

Pleasingly, over \$200,000 was paid to artists in artwork sales and licensing fees, and we plan to increase our focus on paid opportunities for our artists in the years to come. A public highlight were two large banners produced from the colourful artwork of Anthony Romagnano prominently displayed on the facade of the Collingwood Town Hall on Hoddle Street over the summer holidays.

With life in 2022 somewhat back to "normal" we have enjoyed arranging field trips and workshops for our artists, together with a range of collaborative projects and the day-to-day business of art practice development in the studio. I would like to acknowledge and thank all APA artists who have cheerfully adapted to whatever external conditions prevail and still dedicated themselves to their art and to the extraordinary team of staff who work alongside them to facilitate and support their success.

I would also like to acknowledge the professional and committed board of management who govern APA, who provide me with incredible support and advice.







Their talent was recognised through national and international exhibitions, awards, as well as ongoing collabrations with cultural institutions.

ACCA × APA

ACCA: Who's Afraid of Public Space? was a major exhibition, publication and research project exploring the role of public culture, the contested nature of public space, and the character and composition of public life itself. Mikaela Stafford (an interdisciplinary digital artist working from Collingwood Yards) and Sim Luttin co-curated and project managed APA's response.

Four creative collaborative partnerships were formed for the project, each consisting of one APA artist and one established local Melbourne artist. A fifth creative partnership, facilitated by Mikeala Stafford, was also formed with Anthony Romagnano and Boris Cipusev. In this project the APA artists selected works to pair together to create a suite of pithy/playful posters/past-ups.

Think Tank #3: Sim Luttin and Michael Camakaris took part in the third conversation in ACCA's Think Tank series as part of Who's Afraid of Public Space?. The Think Tank engaged with ideas of visibility and accessibility within public space, from architecture and transport to our cultural institutions. Listen here

BENALLA ART GALLERY × APA

Stronger Together is a revolving exhibition of new work by Arts Project Australia artists, presented through a collaboration between Arts Project Australia, Benalla Art Gallery, and its onsite café and restaurant, Munro and Sargeant. All works are displayed on the Munro and Sargeant shelving and are also available for purchase. Proceeds from sales help to support the artists' practices, Arts Project Australia's studio program, and Benalla Art Gallery's dynamic program of exhibitions and events.

From the Studio

The last year has seen the Arts Project Studio build on the wonderful innovations and successes of 2020–2021. Phrases like 'through adversity comes growth' and 'overcoming hard times builds resiliency' have been personified by our artists, staff, and in the general culture of the Studio.

We may not have realised it then, but the early lockdowns and the necessity of very swiftly assessing and adapting how we could best keep our organisation running, enabled us to draft a new template for how our studio can function now and into the future.

We thought that separating the artists out to one desk per person, with Perspex screens and a 1.5 metre spacing between desks would be disastrous. It wasn't. We thought that turning the windowless Northcote Gallery into another studio to fall in with the 4 square metre rules for people inside buildings would be oppressive. It wasn't. We thought that siloing the studios, the artists, and the staff who occupy these spaces would create division and detachment. It didn't. We also thought that the artists wouldn't handle snap lockdowns and switching back to Zoom for studio sessions. They did, and often with exciting results.

Just as boundaries offer opportunities to think creativity, so too, the restrictions made for imaginative solutions to seemingly insurmountable issues. The artists were able to continue to make artwork in an environment that supports, sustains and celebrates their talents, energy, and idiosyncrasies.

Not only did the artists accept this new paradigm without argument or fuss (mostly) but

found ways to socialise and support each other from a distance, sending and swapping internal postcards, organising video phone chats with one another, and adorning the walls and the Perspex screens with photos of themselves as a way to say hi to the artists sitting in those seats on other days. Artists embraced our Facebook Studio Page, which also let families and friends connect with them as well. Many artists flourished in their changed space, enjoying having their own desks to work at, and the ability to spread out in the less populated studio spaces, creating a calmer environment with more time to catch up and discuss their artistic goals with the staff artists. (It's also possible that the hot drink service offered twice a day, in an effort to reduce unnecessary movement throughout the studio, helped to keep people buoyant!). When the second tranche of long lockdowns occurred in 2021, we had to return to online offerings, and everyone just opened their emails, clicked on the link, and jumped on like old pros who'd been hanging out in Zoom rooms all their lives.

Our online experience brought us closer together. The companionship and support offered to each other went beyond making art. We checked in with each other daily, and the opportunity to get to know our artists' families,

support workers, and friends on the other side of the computer screens was a joyous incidental benefit that expanded our community and offered more of the very thing that is a touchstone of our organisation - inclusion and belonging.

Today, as our confidence continues to grow, we are venturing onwards and upwards, reintegrating some of the outward-focused creative activity we had to put on hold for so long. Field trips, artist residencies, professional development workshops, mural commissions, creative partnerships and our much-loved after-hours life drawing sessions, are all part of our studio lives once again. We have been able to visit our gallery in Collingwood Yards more regularly and grow our relationship with that new and exciting precinct. And of course, our wonderful volunteers have started to return, which makes the Studio feel complete again.

We have learned so much through this time and there is palpable excitement about how we can continue to evolve our studio, so that it integrates all the elements that have made it great over the past five decades, but embraces and continues to implement the learnings and innovations that came into being throughout the height of the pandemic.

SATELLITE ARTS

Satellite Arts was well and truly established as a successful mode of program delivery when the long 2021 lockdown kicked in. Many participants were already attending sessions while stay at home orders were lifted, finding the accessibility thoroughly beneficial.

This put us in an excellent position to easily transition our studio-based artists back to online sessions during the lockdown, ensuring artists could remain deeply engaged with their practice and connected to the community. Participation grew to around 30, with people joining in from across Victoria, Tasmania and New South Wales.

In May 2022 we received a \$10,652 grant from State Trustees to broaden the impact of Satellite Arts. This funding will go directly towards actively advertising and promoting Satellite Arts in metropolitan Melbourne and regional Victoria, gradually increasing the places available each week. Our goal is to increase the accessibility and availability of Satellite Arts, a program that has proven to reduce social isolation and build creative skills development for adults living with intellectual disability.

Satellite Arts continues to support participants in developing their art practice by offering the opportunity to join an online creative community. The program gives artists access to professional mentorship and assistance from a highly qualified team of staff artists and the chance to create, discuss, and explore art in a supportive group environment. The content is tailored to each artist's personal working preferences, with the option to join both individual and group sessions on Zoom.

We are keen to continue building and growing this unique program, and welcome inquiries from artists across Australia who may be interested in being a part of our extended artistic community.

APA CREATIVES

In May 2022 we launched APA Creatives – a new annual giving program that shares the magic of our studio and gallery with our community of donors.

APA Creatives is loosely based on the tiered structure used by many arts organisations in that supporters join by making a tax-deductible donation at a level of their choosing. Whether joining as a Studio Cat or Gallery hopper, a Red dot or an Art fanatic all are welcomed into the APA Creatives community. Donors receive early alerts about new work from the studio (Stockroom Secrets) and invitations to a range of events based around coming together to share thoughts and ideas while looking at and learning about art. We are immensely appreciative of the enthusiasm and support we've had for APA Creatives in the first two months of the program.

A NEW KILN FOR APA

In June we ran a campaign to raise funds to replace our ageing kiln. We set a goal of raising \$42,000 to cover the cost of the kiln, ventilation system and new weatherproof shed with storage. With the support of our community we raised \$48,500 and have ordered a Nabertherm 280 Electric (375kg) from Germany. This kiln will heat from the sides and floor and the temperature can be precisely controlled to fire porcelain and stoneware. There is no limit to what our artists will be able to create in the ceramics program once the new kiln is installed.

Gorman x APA Collaboration

July—December 2021

- Our Collingwood Yards gallery reopened in July for Material World. Opening attendees were captivated by a dance performance featuring Bronwyn Hack's bodysuit works. Material World was followed by our Spring1883 satellite showing, in the larger space adjacent to our gallery.
- The APA × Gorman fashion, homewares and childrenswear ranges continued to be a hit with plenty of the colourful range spotted on the streets of Australia.
- Weekly Enter the Stockroom mailouts continued generating a strong sales result and kept audiences connected with APA from home once new covid restrictions took effect.
- Fourteen APA artworks were included in international art auction Art to Roam, raising money for the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW).
- Alan Constable presented a solo show of his inimitable ceramic cameras at Darren Knight gallery, Sydney. Alan also held an online exhibition, Objects That See, as part of Craft Contemporary, and was included in Craft Victoria's end-of-year exhibition Shaped.
- Outside of APA's gallery, Michael Camakaris completed a curatorial mentorship with Blindside, resulting in virtual exhibition Variations. FEMaFFINITY completed its Australian tour, finishing up at Benalla Art Gallery in September. Julian

- Martin and Warren O'Brien took part in Modern Times' Radiant Dreams group show. Nick Capaldo showed a suite of works in Melbourne's famed Campbell Arcade in group show Cosmic Analogues. Emily Dobber held a solo show at Red Gallery, Fitzroy.
- Our artists were successful in a number of art prizes including Terry Williams in the Wangaratta Contemporary Textile Award, Jacob Cartelli in the Calleen Art Award, Nhan Nguyen and Steven Perrette in the Mission to Seafarers Maritime Art Prize, and Bronwyn Hack in the Arthur Guy Memorial Painting Prize.
- Anthony Romagnano had a great run during this time, winning the Best Portrait Award at the Linden Postcard Show. Anthony was also commissioned to create large scale banners which were displayed on the facade of Collingwood Town Hall for the festive season.
- For ACCA's Who's Afraid of Public Space programming, APA created outdoor exhibition To the Streets, pairing four APA artists with their Melbourne peers, to create paste up posters which were displayed throughout Collingwood.
- Our Collingwood Yards gallery reopened post end-of year lockdowns in December for an Art et al. pop-up exhibition followed by the 2021 Annual Gala. The Gala, featured 239 artworks by 162 artists and generated \$24,000 in artwork sales.

January—June 2021

- Collingwood Yards exhibitions during this period included Sincerely Yours curated by Sophia Cai, Circleworks curated by Trent Walter and Plant/Life curated by Kirsty Grant. Mark Smith also held a solo exhibition Ugly/Beautiful as part of PHOTO 2022.
- Out and about, Miles Howard-Wilks, William Murray and Georgia Szmerling showed photographic works as part of CCP's salon, while Alan Constable and Lisa Reid had ceramics included in Conners Conners ceramics exhibition. Ruth Howard and Patrick Francis took part in Frame of Mind's group show Trust the Process, and Boris Cipusev and Alan Constable were included in NGV × National Portrait Gallery's Who Are you: Australian Portraiture.
- We represented publications and artist zines at NGV's Melbourne Art Book Fair and Sticky Institute Festival of the Photocopier, Melbourne. We also participated in Melbourne Art Fair's Precinct Night at Collingwood Yards, and ACCA's Das Boot artist car boot sale.

- Internationally, Sonia Dutton Gallery presented the works of Anthony Romagnano, Alan Constable, Chris O'Brien, Lisa Reid and Paul Hodges at the Outsider Art Fair, New York. Several APA artists' works were shown at Art et al.'s Season One exhibition at Cromwell Place, London. Georgia Szmerling completed an Art et al. Peer/Peer collaboration with UK based ceramic artist Holly Stevenson.
